

## The Second Symposium of the Polish Society of Clinical Pharmacy

The Second Symposium of the Polish Society of Clinical Pharmacy (PTFK) will be held on 20 October, 2024, in Krakow. The main theme of the event is medication use review, as this is one of the key clinical pharmacy services provided in both hospital and primary care.

The Symposium program includes lectures on medication use review and related workshops allowing pharmacists to improve their practical skills. The Symposium is an opportunity to meet and share know-how of those interested in the development of clinical pharmacy services, and inspire further innovations in terms of optimizing pharmacotherapy in Poland. Conference attendees will be awarded four credit points. The Second Symposium of the PTFK will be accompanied by the 52nd Symposium of the European Society of Clinical Pharmacy (ESCP), which takes place on 21-23 October 2024.

## The first meeting of the Commission for the Sustainable Night-Time Economy has concluded

The night-time economy and the challenges it poses are an important aspect of a well-functioning city, so it should develop with respect for the rights of all social groups. The Commission for the Sustainable Night-Time Economy, composed of 30 members, is responsible for developing the night-time economy. The inaugural meeting, launching the work of the Commission, was held Tuesday at City Hall.

The Commission for the Sustainable Night-Time Economy, established by order of the Mayor, will focus on activities related to the challenges posed by the night-time economy and on forming the right relations between residents, businesses and visitors to the city. The Commission is composed of 30 members and is chaired by Jacek Jordan, the first Night Mayor of Krakow. The members represent the city's public administration, including the City Council of Krakow, district councils, relevant departments and services, business associations, and also the social side (individuals affiliated with NGOs), and informal groups of residents.

The Commission held its inaugural meeting on Tuesday, 13 August, at which it adopted a schedule of meetings for the near future, rules of procedure, and directions for the three working groups: public safety and order, infrastructure and logistics, and facilities provided for residents and tourists. The objective of the Commission will be to work out solutions to help the tourism industry, so that it develops with respect for the needs of all social groups, including residents. The Commission will meet once a month, preceded by meetings of the working groups formed as teams.

This will help to introduce principles and standards for the night-time economy in the sectors of business, culture and heritage, tourism, security and public order, the city transport system, and public health. In practice, this means introducing solutions that will bring relief to residents and further safeguard Krakow's priceless heritage.



The night-time economy is becoming the key element in developing every major city's strategy, including Krakow. Despite its many benefits, the night-time economy is also fraught with challenges. Thus, ensuring safety and public order and developing cultural offerings and creative industries are some of the priorities of the city.
